The Struggle for Character



Every person is made in God's image (Genesis 1:27)



Sin damages this image in unbelievers (Romans 7:15,18–19)



The world system promotes selfishness (Ephesians 2:2–3)





God Shapes Our Character



Honorable character comes from God



'Character' comes from the Latin word which means 'engraved'



Jesus is the exact image of the Father (Hebrews 1:3, John 14:9)



God is shaping us into Christ's image (Philippians 2:13, Romans 8:29)



Our Inner Image

Everyone has a dominant inner image of who they are

Formed early in life — shaped by age 18

God transforms our selfimage (Romans 12:2)

Character Requires Faith

We rely on the Holy Spirit to live like Jesus

Live by the Spirit, not the flesh (Gal 5:16; 1 Thessalonians 2:12)

Christian life: Choose Jesus, then choose the next right thing

Not About Rules

Not just following new rules or trying harder

Jesus' standard is too high to reach alone

We let God live through us (John 5:19; 8:28–29; 14:10)



Character Shapes Society

- Society reflects what it values
- True virtue changes us from the inside
- We need God's help to grow in virtue (Mark Rutland)




Virtue is Strength

Virtue = strength ('virtus')

Power flows through virtue (Luke 6:19)

God honors the honorable (Romans 8:36–37; 1 Samuel 2:30)



Reverence = Obedience

Fearing God means living by His ways

Respecting His Word over our own ideas or feelings

Obedience shows true honor for God

Trusting


Trusting God to handle the results
